LAST WEEK JUNE 30 GRADED SCRATCH RACES – AFL PARK

A glorious morning brought everyone out to the Park in the afternoon, but unfortunately it became a bit overcast and cooler as the day wore on.

Nevertheless, conditions could not have been much better, with virtually no wind, just a zephyr from the south, which meant race speeds were high. 81 riders turned up and with some major reshuffles of grades for some riders and a combination of A and B saw large competitive fields in all grades. The races went from 2 hours for A/B Grade down to $1\frac{1}{4}$ for F Grade.

Four riders in A/B Grade cleared out and were within about a quarter of a lap of lapping the rest of their bunch, so the judges decided to take pity on the remaining riders and award a fifth place. The winner, surprise surprise, was Phil Thompson from B Graders Martin Stalder, Roger Byrnes, Steve Pryor, with David Kenney winning the bonus fifth place for the bunch sprint.

C Grade had the biggest field of the day with 24 riders, including a number of promotions for the day in Alan Sandford, Bill Dove, Ian Smith, Barry Rogers, Hilton Preece and Graham Cadd. Geoff Vincent won from Brod Taylor with Nick Panou just holding of Alan Sandford and Greg Molesworth.

Because of the promotions to C Grade, D Grade did not have the biggest field for a change, but nevertheless the 20 riders kept the pace up for an average race speed of 35 km/hr. Andy Maclean and David Trigar did a lot of work early, then towards the end of the race Harold Simpson, Alex Reinehr, Glen Archer and Bill Upston were always near the front. In the sprint Harold Simpson was too strong for a fast finishing Ken Woollard, with Steve Oberg, who was dropped after the intermediate sprint, finishing third and David McCormack just beating Clive Wright for fourth.

Hans Werner was too strong for the 12 E Grade riders, doing long turns at the front and winning from Phillip Johns, Don Ferguson and John C Wilson. Hans was the only dual winner of the day in winning both the intermediate sprint and race.

Our lady riders had a good day in F Grade, with Gayle Pung, winning from Liz Randall and new rider Mick Fisher third in his second race.

A great day's racing at a great venue, a pity that we will lose it one day soon.

NERANG CRITERIUM CIRCUIT

For those of you who haven't been there, this a photo looking back from just short of the finish line at the Nerang Criterium Circuit, Gold Coast. There are three circuits, the main one comes in from the left at the top of the hill, an intermediate circuit, in from the right at the top of the hill and the easiest one, in from the right at the bottom. The hill is steeper than it looks and makes for fast sprinting at the finish. The trouble is you have to climb, about twice the elevation of the hill shown. Nevertheless a great facility and if only we could get something like this in Melbourne..

TRACK RACING AT VODAFONE ARENA

Steve Di Tullio earlier described his Summer Track Season touring Victoria on his postie bike. He now tells us what it is like at Vodafone Arena. Racing at Vodafone is in contrast to Colin's Smythes's account of racing at the Essendon Board Track.

The Vodafone arena is located in Swan St, Melbourne, in the Sporting precinct. It is opposite Olympic Park and next door to the Rod Laver Arena. The track itself is made out of Baltic pine and measures 250m in length with the main banks being 42 degrees, which looks bloody steep rolling around at the top or standing on the walkway landing watching the races, the main straights are at an angle of 12 degrees. The Baltic pine is laid in the direction of riding, most unlike the Essendon track (see Colin Smythe's article June 9) there is no distinct rattling and rumbling, just all smooth power on the boards.

I could not have chosen a bigger race, the famous Austral Wheel Race, to make my debut on a type of track that I had absolutely no experience on, but we have to start somewhere. It just so happens that this particular Austral Wheel Race was an absolute sell out and they actually turned away about 300-400 patrons wanting to get in. The velodrome seats approximately 4500 people and the management then went on to sell the standing room areas on the corners where they squeezed in another 300 patrons.

The track is super fast and this was driven home to me when on my first ride I had a 50 x 15 gear on (90 inch). All Christmas, I had struggled to get on top of this size gear in races, well I rolled three laps at the start of the warm up at Vodafone and went straight off and put on 48 x 14, giving me 92.6. This wasn't a bad gear to use, but it wasn't until the last race of my track season that I thought I found the right gear 52 x 15 (93.6), now I have to wait until next year.

Unlike Colin Smythe's experiences with track racing, their was only one bookie at the track and he did reasonably good business on the Austral night. There were some criticisms of the public address system and eventually over a number of carnivals the Victorian cycling mob got it close to right.

Well much like my Christmas racing I did not fair too well at the Austral, but it was absolutely fantastic to race in front of such a large crowd. Unfortunately after the Austral the next three carnivals did not get anywhere near as many spectators in and although the crowd was small the racing was still good to watch and participate in. I do not know why the punters stayed away, maybe it was the outlaying of \$20-\$25, depending on where you sat, four weeks running that turned them off.

A few falls occurred and most of them happened as the bunch rolled around to get the gun to start races. With riders not going fast enough or keeping pressure on the pedals going around the banks they just slid down the track taking out riders underneath them and causing a chain reaction among the field. Some other spectacular falls occurred through the good ol' plain hook as a rider comes around you and the best one of the carnivals was Ryan Bayley (W.A) being taken out by Jeff Hopkins (N.S.W.). Ryan came down and slid a good 20m along the track picked up his bike walked straight down the steps he stopped next to and sat in his seat trying to soak up the pain. he did not ride the next week due to a super large bruise on his hip.

Well, that is Vodafone arena and the good oil is that a new indoor velodrome is going to be built on the existing site of the Northcote velodrome. Work will commence sometime in the near future with the Northcote club being warned it won't have a track for this coming track season and possibly the 2002/03 season as well.

Everyone has heard this story for ages but apparently the funds are there and waiting!

Licences

Everyone should have received letters from the AVCC and the VVCC regarding insurance. In a nutshell our current insurance runs out on 31 October and licences will need to be renewed from then. The good news is that the new licences will run to 31 December, 2002 and that the cost for the extra 2 months is only \$5. We are now insured with QBE for the same premium as charged by HIH. All up, the collapse of HIH has cost us \$5, which is not too bad.

Fees for 2001 – 2002 will be \$70 (licence, AVCC and VVCC contribution) plus the Club's proportion, which in the past has been \$10. This amount will be set at the next committee meeting on September, 5. In the meantime there is no need to do anything, just race and enjoy it.

I also have a copy of the certificate of insurance which covers us any where in Australia for the benefits listed below. Don't ask me, I don't understand what it means either, but I will try and find out.

Personal Accident

Capital Benefits \$50,000 (Death Cover Limited to \$10,000 for under training) percentage scale as per policy.

Weekly Benefits 80% or \$300 per week whichever is the lesser. Maximum Benefit 52 weeks,

Deficite to the first the least. Maximum Benefit of weeks,

14 day excess period.

Medical Benefits 80% reimbursement. Maximum Benefit 52 weeks and \$1000 in all. Excess

for each and every loss.

Public Liability \$10,000,000. Excess \$500 each and every loss.

SEPTEMBER 1 GRADED SCRATCH RACES YARRA GLEN TOOLANGI

Races have been cancelled for a number of reasons this season. Eastern have lost two because of wet weather, Southern because of fog and now Eastern lose one to a car rally!

A Saturday phone call from the locals Steve Fothergill after consultation with Colin Smythe warned of possible problems with Saturday's race, because the Australian Rally Championship had taken over the Yarra Glen race course and we would have to find another place to park the cars. Arrival at Yarra Glen showed the problem was more serious, 60+ rally cars as well as support vehicles and spectators would be travelling from Healesville to Yarra Glen in the afternoon. The prospect seemed to be a bit dangerous, so everyone adjourned to Steels Creek. Not having a race permit to race on the Steels Creek course, wiser heads prevailed and it was decided not to race.

Racing without a permit may have made any

claims difficult in the case of a fall and jeopardised our applications for future permits. Obviously the Rally would have had to obtain a permit and it is a pity that we were not advised that permits were granted to both organisations for the use of public roads on the same day. Anyway we must remember to make sure we don't clash again next year.

Training rides seemed to be the best option and two bunches did 3 laps of the Steels Creek course, in pretty slick time for a training ride. Another bunch rode up the Mount Slide Road (an 8 km climb on a dirt road) to the Kinglake – Healesville Road, across through Toolangi and down the Myers Creek Road.

Notwithstanding widespread rain in various suburbs on Saturday morning and afternoon, there was no rain at all at Steels Creek or across the top through Toolangi.

AUGUST 25 GRADED SCRATCH RACES STEELS CREEK

Following the cancellation of racing last week, the sunny morning was likely to attract a few more starters than usual. However, perhaps people were put off by the weather forecast which was for a late change. Sunny skies and strong northerlies greeted the 36 starters, with the hills cunningly hiding threatening clouds from the west. The sun disappeared just as we started, but the good news was that the wind gradually declined in strength.

B Grade was first away the plan being for the A Graders to give them a start and chase. The plan came unstuck when Rob Graham found a new way to miss a race, by

puncturing during the warm up, replacing the tube, only for that to go flat also. Rob then retired to the judging panel, leaving Phil Thompson and Andrew Laird to chase. Phil rode off and did his best, but although closing the gap was unable to catch the B Graders. B Grade included Ian Smith, who has earned rapid promotion after winning the Le Tour Classic Handicap in June off 24 minutes and winning once in C Grade. Dayle Goodall winning from Ross Edwards and Nick Skews. In C Grade, Michael Pitrun after his extended sojourn overseas won from Andy Maclean and Geoff Schreppell. D Grade rode off the line like men possessed and seemed to be hell bent on catching

C Grade, evidently they thought it was a handicap and had to catch the bunch in front. The average speed for the first lap was an unlikely 34 km/hr. Common sense eventually prevailed and particularly by the third lap, the pace had slowed right down, leaving the gate open for the sprinters Harold Simpson and Glenn Archer to get the money over Keith Bowen. New rider John Hopkins did a lot of work and is sure to be in the money soon. Surprise, surprise, John Porter won again in E Grade from Phillip Johns and

Leon Bishop, while in F Grade Liz Randall was too good, winning from Grigor McGibbon.

All in all an enjoyable days racing with a special thanks to the officials of the day. With Steve Fothergill stationed half way along the course and Steve Di Tullio riding 'shot gun' along the course, it was comforting to know that in the event of a puncture, or a fall, help was near at hand.

THE NIGHT THE S...t. HIT THE FAN

Little did we know when we arrived at the Olympic Velodrome this night that it would have been the most frightening night in Australian sporting history. More about that later. I am pleased to say that after nearly 45 years, of the 160 riders who took part that night, only 3 are still racing and all with Eastern Vets. Our vibrant President Alan Sandford, Ivan Collings and me. There was an L Gibson from Stawell entered who may be the Leon Gibson racing with the Stawell Vets. There is a strong connection between Ivan, Alan and me, Ivan and I raced on the road together, mostly off the same mark for a long period in the 50's. I transferred to Brunswick in 1959 after 10 years and raced against Alan, who had to give me a start in track racing, he was always a great sprinter. Ivan of course has the wonderful distinction of being a great road rider and has also achieved the dream of all trackies, winning the Austral.

This was the night we had all waited for a long time, to race for the first time on the new Olympic Velodrome. The meeting was an all amateur international meeting six days after the closure of the Melbourne Olympic Games. Members of the Italian team were also entered on this wonderful night of racing of various events. The Italians were led by the incredible Ercole Baldini, who 7 days previously had destroyed the world class field in the Olympic road race, winning by 1 minute 59 sec from Arnaud Geyre of France and Alan Jackson of Great Britain Ireland. third. Baldini also held 3 World records, I think one was the one hour record and I am not sure of the others. Also present was Leandro Faggin, 1 km track time trial winner in the record time of 1m 9.8 sec. He also World record holder in this event with a time of 1m 9.2 sec for the time. You could not miss this bloke, he was one of those rare Italians with blond hair. Faggin also won gold in the Teams Pursuit. Other members of the team were Valentino Gasparella, Antonio Domenicali and Franco Gandini. Guelliemo Pesenti, silver medallist in the sprint also raced that night. So you can see that the Italian team was easily the most successful in the Olympics, with 3 gold, 1 silver and a bronze in the tandem. Never before had such a line up of stars raced at an Australian Amateur track meeting, Baldini, Gasparella, Faggin, Pesenti, also our great bronze medallist in the sprint, Dick Ploog, Neville Perkinson (NZ), Jan Buis (Holland), Peter Brotherton (GB) and Fred Markus (Canada). I must mention that Australia won gold in the Tandem with Melbourne's own Ian Browne and Tony Marchant, with remarkable time of

10.8 sec for the last 220 yards and of course Dick Ploog was also from Melbourne. Ian rode for Hawthorn, Tony Chelsea and Dick Coburg, all three medals by local boys and by God we were proud of them. Scratchmen in the Velodrome Handicap were Clive Middleton (Essendon), Peter George (Footscray), and a human powerhouse in John Perry (Brunswick).

By the time the first event is due to start, spectators are hanging from the rafters. At least 11,000 are present in a stadium limited to 10,000. They are packed in like sardines and 10,000 are Italians, come to see their idols in action. In all my years at the Essendon Board track, I had not seen anything like this, an awesome sight.

Racing got underway with a Junior B Grade scratch race of 3000 metres (9 laps) and contained future stars in Ron Baench, Brian Drew and Tassie Johnson. The next event is the E Grade scratch and includes Stewart Doyle, who has made his name a great cycling announcer/caller. Third event is the D Grade scratch and I get a bit of a buzz to be balloted to carry number 1, Ivan Collings is number 4, and my lifetime mate John May number 15. I'm happy to finish a close up 5th after a pretty rough ride. Most riders had not ridden the track before as we were not allowed to train on it. I dug my pedal into the bend coming into the finishing straight, pretty frightening. Many riders did the same thing over the years at this spot, a small bump in the surface perhaps.

One of the feature races of the night is a Pursuit match race over 4000 metres. Clive Middleton, the local Essendon rider versus Ercole Baldini. This freakish Italian runs down Clive in about 5 of the designated 12 laps. Baldini was an absolute machine and made it look so easy, I take nothing away from Middleton, he was a great rider. By now the Italian crowd are going crazy, they have got what they have come to see, their man has won the road race and a track pursuit in the space of 7 days, awesome stuff.

Then we have the Velodrome Wheel Race heats, Alan Sandford has 25 yards, Ivan Collings and I have 60 yards, limit is 150 yards. My mate, John tells me that John Baker (Brunswick), 130 yards won the final over 3 laps (1000 metres).

Then at 9.52 pm the second heat of the International Derby starts, Guglielmo Pesenti, John Perry, Max Guest, Arthur Bateman and Tony Andreatta are away over 3 laps (1000 metres). To me Pesenti appears to

be riding in a nervous manner in strange surrounds. At about half way they are working up to about half pace, Pesenti is trying to get a sit on Perry, but Max is helping John and positions himself between them to back Pesenti off. Pesenti doesn't handle it and hits the deck. The fall appears to be a light one, but the Italian spectators go berserk, the roar that went up was unbelievable, and continues with abuse and catcalls, because Pesenti doesn't get up. He stays down like a soccer player trying to get the offending player sent off. All sorts of missiles start to come over the fence as John Perry, Max Guest, Arthur Bateman and Tony Andreatta come into the front straight. Suddenly the blond headed Faggin runs at Perry, swinging a chair at him. John who is a big guy and doesn't take crap from anybody is off the bike and as the Italian team manager starts to swing at him like a barn door, he grabs his bike by the front wheel and swings it like a golf club at the two of them. After copping a whack, the team manager loses interest very quickly.

This is where we get to the title of the story. The shit hits the fan, the Italian spectators are coming over the fence and we are in big trouble, within a minute the it's on for young and old in the centre of the track. The situation doesn't get any better, because Pesenti is still sitting on his backside in the middle of the back straight. Maxie Guest is shaping up to them and letting them know he won't take any shit either. According to Alan they all keep their distance from Maxie, but by this time the mob are all getting stuck into the rest of us. Someone yelled out, 'get in a group, get in a group' and that probably saved us from serious injury. Think about it, we are out

numbered 10 to 1, and are arming ourselves with anything we can lay our hands on, most guys do what Johnny and I did, arm ourselves with our pumps which were all made of metal in 1956. Two or three have bike chains and suddenly a huge brawl erupts in the main stand. My mates from South Melbourne Pros are right in it, particularly the Brothertons, Keith and Billy. They are doing well until Billy gets bowled down the concrete steps, hits his head and takes no further part. The whole stadium is total chaos for about 15 minutes, with fights, missile throwing and abuse, until the police reinforcements arrive and quickly take control of the situation, in 1956, unlike today, more's the pity, they were allowed to use a bit of force in situations like this.

Eventually Pesenti gets up and walks back past me with arms stretched out in front of him. I can see he has lost a bit of skin off his claws and I'm thinking that the pathetic look on his face suggests that maybe he has never fallen before, can't be true, I'd like ten bucks for every time I have.

The place comes to order very quickly when the fans see that Pesenti is OK and after a quick clean up of the track, racing gets underway again without any further incident for the evening.

In closing the story, I must say that the 14 December, 1956 was the most frightening day of my life. 3 days before my 21st birthday. Looking back on it, we were very lucky that night.

Hope you enjoyed this piece of cycling history.

31ST NOVE COLLI

Colin Speller rides the 31st Nove Colli

The Nove Colli rides starts and finishes in Cesantico, not far from San Marino in northern Italy. The ride is named after the nine peaks that you climb during the ride. There are two options, a 200km ride climbing all the peaks, which means you climb a total of 2864 metres, or the shorter 130 km ride, climbing 4 peaks and a total of 1335 metres.

10,000 riders, yes 10,000, participate in the ride and all are individually timed and placed in order. The ride starts in three groups of 3000+ riders. You can imagine that with this number of riders things are pretty congested, but fortunately there were no falls. With such a large number of riders, when the field reaches some of the narrow streets in the villages, there is not enough room for everyone and those at the back of the field have to get off and walk.

As those who have ridden in Europe would know, the hospitality and support given to cyclists is unbelievable. Roads closed, cheering crowds, no abuse from passing motorists, absolute courtesy at all times. You get all this in the Nove Colli. The 130km ride means you climb 4 of the nine peaks, the longest and

steepest, Barbotto, has an overall gradient of 6.9%, but includes a section with a gradient of 18%! They time everyone up this climb. (For comparison the gradient of the '1 in 20' climb in the Dandenongs, if it is 1 in 20, is 5%).

They feed you well, the first feeding station is at 65km and the second at 85km before you attempt the Barbotto climb. There were something like 40 people serving food at these stations and they catered for every cyclist's wish for foods to sustain you. The same thing happens at the finish.

How did I go? Pretty good I thought, 4,141 out of 10,000, with an average speed of 23.5 and a time of 6 hr 8 min, which included a time of 32 min up Barbotto climb of 5.5 km.

By the way the fastest time was 3 hour 33 minutes, which is an average of 36.6 km/hr! Unbelievable!

Will I be there next year? You bet. I forgot to mention the weather, it was just perfect.





SEPTEMBER 1 GRADED SCRATCH RACES YARRA GLEN TOOLANGI

Races have been cancelled for a number of reasons this season. Eastern have lost two races because of wet weather, Southern one because of fog and now Eastern lose one to a car rally!

A Saturday phone call from local Steve Fothergill after consultation with Colin Smythe, warned of possible problems with Saturday's race, because the Australian Rally Championship had taken over the Yarra Glen race course and we would have to find another place to park the cars. Arrival at Yarra Glen showed the problem was more serious, 60+ rally cars as well as support vehicles and spectators would be travelling from Healesville to Yarra Glen in the afternoon. The prospect of being rammed from behind by a rall car seemed to be a bit dangerous, so everyone adjourned to Steels Creek. Not having a race permit to race on the Steels Creek course, wiser heads prevailed and it was decided not to race.

Racing without a permit may have made any

claims difficult in the case of a fall and jeopardised our applications for future permits from the council and police if we had been found out. Obviously the Rally would have had to obtain a permit and it is a pity that we were not advised that permits were granted to both organisations for the use of public roads on the same day. Anyway we must remember to make sure we don't clash again next year.

Training rides seemed to be the best option and two bunches did 3 laps of the Steels Creek course, in a pretty slick time for a training ride. Another bunch rode up the Mount Slide Road (an 8 km climb on a dirt road) to the Kinglake – Healesville Road, across through Toolangi and down the Myers Creek Road.

Notwithstanding widespread rain in various suburbs on Saturday morning and afternoon, there was no rain at all at Steels Creek or across the top through Toolangi.

AUGUST 25 GRADED SCRATCH RACES STEELS CREEK

Following the cancellation of racing last week, the sunny morning was likely to attract a few more starters than usual. However, perhaps people were put off by the weather forecast which was for a late change. Sunny skies and strong northerlies greeted the 36 starters, with the hills cunningly hiding threatening clouds from the west. The sun disappeared just as we started, but the good news was that the wind gradually declined in strength.

B Grade was first away the plan being for the A Graders to give them a start and chase. The plan came unstuck when

Rob Graham found a new way to miss a race, by puncturing during the warm up, replacing the tube, only for that to go flat also. Rob then retired to the judging panel, leaving Phil Thompson and Andrew Laird to chase. Phil rode off and did his best, but although closing the gap was unable to catch the B Graders. B Grade included Ian Smith, who has earned rapid promotion after winning the Le Tour Classic Handicap in June off 24 minutes and winning once in C Grade. Dayle Goodall winning from Ross Edwards and Nick Skews. In C Grade, Michael Pitrun after his extended sojourn overseas won from Andy

Maclean and Geoff Schreppell. D Grade rode off the line like men possessed and seemed to be hell bent on catching C Grade, evidently they thought it was a handicap and had to catch the bunch in front. The average speed for the first lap was an unlikely 34 km/hr. Common sense eventually prevailed and particularly by the third lap, the pace had slowed right down, leaving the gate open for the sprinters Harold Simpson and Glenn Archer to get the money over Keith Bowen. New rider John Hopkins did a lot of work and is sure to be in the money soon. Surprise, surprise, John Porter won again in E Grade from Phillip Johns and

Leon Bishop, while in F Grade Liz Randall was too good, winning from Grigor McGibbon.

All in all an enjoyable days racing with a special thanks to the officials of the day. With Steve Fothergill stationed half way along the course and Steve Di Tullio riding 'shot gun' along the course, it was comforting to know that in the event of a puncture, or a fall, help was near at hand.

THE NIGHT THE S...t. HIT THE FAN

Little did we know when we arrived at the Olympic Velodrome this night that it would have been the most frightening night in Australian sporting history. More about that later. I am pleased to say that after nearly 45 years, of the 160 riders who took part that night, only 3 are still racing and all with Eastern Vets. Our vibrant President Alan Sandford, Ivan Collings and me. There was an L Gibson from Stawell entered who may be the Leon Gibson racing with the Stawell Vets. There is a strong connection between Ivan, Alan and me, Ivan and I raced on the road together, mostly off the same mark for a long period in the 50's. I transferred to Brunswick in 1959 after 10 years and raced against Alan, who had to give me a start in track racing, he was always a great sprinter. Ivan of course has the wonderful distinction of being a great road rider and has also achieved the dream of all trackies, winning the Austral.

This was the night we had all waited for a long time, to race for the first time on the new Olympic Velodrome. The meeting was an all amateur international meeting six days after the closure of the Melbourne Olympic Games. Members of the Italian team were also entered on this wonderful night of racing of various events. The Italians were led by the incredible Ercole Baldini, who 7 days previously had destroyed the world class field in the Olympic road race, winning by 1 minute 59 sec from Arnaud Geyre of France and Alan Jackson of Great Britain Ireland. third. Baldini also held 3 World records, I think one was the one hour record and I am not sure of the others. Also present was Leandro Faggin, 1 km track time trial winner in the record time of 1m 9.8 sec. He also World record holder in this event with a time of 1m 9.2 sec for the time. You could not miss this bloke, he was one of those rare Italians with blond hair. Faggin also won gold in the Teams Pursuit. Other members of the team were Valentino Gasparella, Antonio Domenicali and Franco Gandini. Guelliemo Pesenti, silver medallist in the sprint also raced that night. So you can see that the Italian team was easily the most successful in the Olympics, with 3 gold, 1 silver and a bronze in the tandem. Never before had such a line up of stars raced at an Australian Amateur track meeting, Baldini, Gasparella, Faggin, Pesenti, also our great bronze medallist in the sprint, Dick Ploog, Neville Perkinson (NZ), Jan Buis (Holland), Peter Brotherton (GB) and Fred Markus (Canada). I must mention that Australia won gold in the Tandem with Melbourne's own Ian Browne and Tony Marchant, with remarkable time of

10.8 sec for the last 220 yards and of course Dick Ploog was also from Melbourne. Ian rode for Hawthorn, Tony Chelsea and Dick Coburg, all three medals by local boys and by God we were proud of them. Scratchmen in the Velodrome Handicap were Clive Middleton (Essendon), Peter George (Footscray), and a human powerhouse in John Perry (Brunswick).

By the time the first event is due to start, spectators are hanging from the rafters. At least 11,000 are present in a stadium limited to 10,000. They are packed in like sardines and 10,000 are Italians, come to see their idols in action. In all my years at the Essendon Board track, I had not seen anything like this, an awesome sight.

Racing got underway with a Junior B Grade scratch race of 3000 metres (9 laps) and contained future stars in Ron Baench, Brian Drew and Tassie Johnson. The next event is the E Grade scratch and includes Stewart Doyle, who has made his name a great cycling announcer/caller. Third event is the D Grade scratch and I get a bit of a buzz to be balloted to carry number 1, Ivan Collings is number 4, and my lifetime mate John May number 15. I'm happy to finish a close up 5th after a pretty rough ride. Most riders had not ridden the track before as we were not allowed to train on it. I dug my pedal into the bend coming into the finishing straight, pretty frightening. Many riders did the same thing over the years at this spot, a small bump in the surface perhaps.

One of the feature races of the night is a Pursuit match race over 4000 metres. Clive Middleton, the local Essendon rider versus Ercole Baldini. This freakish Italian runs down Clive in about 5 of the designated 12 laps. Baldini was an absolute machine and made it look so easy, I take nothing away from Middleton, he was a great rider. By now the Italian crowd are going crazy, they have got what they have come to see, their man has won the road race and a track pursuit in the space of 7 days, awesome stuff.

Then we have the Velodrome Wheel Race heats, Alan Sandford has 25 yards, Ivan Collings and I have 60 yards, limit is 150 yards. My mate, John tells me that John Baker (Brunswick), 130 yards won the final over 3 laps (1000 metres).

Then at 9.52 pm the second heat of the International Derby starts, Guglielmo Pesenti, John Perry, Max Guest, Arthur Bateman and Tony Andreatta are away over 3 laps (1000 metres). To me Pesenti appears to

be riding in a nervous manner in strange surrounds. At about half way they are working up to about half pace, Pesenti is trying to get a sit on Perry, but Max is helping John and positions himself between them to back Pesenti off. Pesenti doesn't handle it and hits the deck. The fall appears to be a light one, but the Italian spectators go berserk, the roar that went up was unbelievable, and continues with abuse and catcalls, because Pesenti doesn't get up. He stays down like a soccer player trying to get the offending player sent off. All sorts of missiles start to come over the fence as John Perry, Max Guest, Arthur Bateman and Tony Andreatta come into the front straight. Suddenly the blond headed Faggin runs at Perry, swinging a chair at him. John who is a big guy and doesn't take crap from anybody is off the bike and as the Italian team manager starts to swing at him like a barn door, he grabs his bike by the front wheel and swings it like a golf club at the two of them. After copping a whack, the team manager loses interest very quickly.

This is where we get to the title of the story. The shit hits the fan, the Italian spectators are coming over the fence and we are in big trouble, within a minute the it's on for young and old in the centre of the track. The situation doesn't get any better, because Pesenti is still sitting on his backside in the middle of the back straight. Maxie Guest is shaping up to them and letting them know he won't take any shit either. According to Alan they all keep their distance from Maxie, but by this time the mob are all getting stuck into the rest of us. Someone yelled out, 'get in a group, get in a group' and that probably saved us from serious injury. Think about it, we are out

numbered 10 to 1, and are arming ourselves with anything we can lay our hands on, most guys do what Johnny and I did, arm ourselves with our pumps which were all made of metal in 1956. Two or three have bike chains and suddenly a huge brawl erupts in the main stand. My mates from South Melbourne Pros are right in it, particularly the Brothertons, Keith and Billy. They are doing well until Billy gets bowled down the concrete steps, hits his head and takes no further part. The whole stadium is total chaos for about 15 minutes, with fights, missile throwing and abuse, until the police reinforcements arrive and quickly take control of the situation, in 1956, unlike today, more's the pity, they were allowed to use a bit of force in situations like this.

Eventually Pesenti gets up and walks back past me with arms stretched out in front of him. I can see he has lost a bit of skin off his claws and I'm thinking that the pathetic look on his face suggests that maybe he has never fallen before, can't be true, I'd like ten bucks for every time I have.

The place comes to order very quickly when the fans see that Pesenti is OK and after a quick clean up of the track, racing gets underway again without any further incident for the evening.

In closing the story, I must say that the 14 December, 1956 was the most frightening day of my life. 3 days before my 21st birthday. Looking back on it, we were very lucky that night.

Hope you enjoyed this piece of cycling history.

31ST NOVE COLLI

Colin Speller rides the 31st Nove Colli

The Nove Colli rides starts and finishes in Cesantico, not far from San Marino in northern Italy. The ride is named after the nine peaks that you climb during the ride. There are two options, a 200km ride climbing all the peaks, which means you climb a total of 2864 metres, or the shorter 130 km ride, climbing 4 peaks and a total of 1335 metres.

10,000 riders, yes 10,000, participate in the ride and all are individually timed and placed in order. The ride starts in three groups of 3000+ riders. You can imagine that with this number of riders things are pretty congested, but fortunately there were no falls. With such a large number of riders, when the field reaches some of the narrow streets in the villages, there is not enough room for everyone and those at the back of the field have to get off and walk.

As those who have ridden in Europe would know, the hospitality and support given to cyclists is unbelievable. Roads closed, cheering crowds, no abuse from passing motorists, absolute courtesy at all times. You get all this in the Nove Colli. The 130km ride means you climb 4 of the nine peaks, the longest and

steepest, Barbotto, has an overall gradient of 6.9%, but includes a section with a gradient of 18%! They time everyone up this climb. (For comparison the gradient of the '1 in 20' climb in the Dandenongs, if it is 1 in 20, is 5%).

They feed you well, the first feeding station is at 65km and the second at 85km before you attempt the Barbotto climb. There were something like 40 people serving food at these stations and they catered for every cyclist's wish for foods to sustain you. The same thing happens at the finish.

How did I go? Pretty good I thought, 4,141 out of 10,000, with an average speed of 23.5 and a time of 6 hr 8 min, which included a time of 32 min up Barbotto climb of 5.5 km.

By the way the fastest time was 3 hour 33 minutes, which is an average of 36.6 km/hr! Unbelievable!

Will I be there next year? You bet. I forgot to mention the weather, it was just perfect.





Legends of the Track

During the past 5 years I have compiled a history about 114 years of Australian track cycling with an emphasis on the famous Austral Wheel race. The story contains 251 pages of text supported with 140 illustrations printed on 235x155 mm matt art paper, perfect bound with a laminated finish. This unique publication will represent an important record of our cycling sport and become an indispensable addition to the bookshelves of all cycling fans.

The book takes the reader inside the world of whirring wheels through boom times, slumps and revivals. It recalls the Grand days of the early Australs on high bikes on the MCG and the cycling craze following the introduction of the 'safety-machine'.

The story reflects the ups and downs of cycling over the years. It deals with the golden days, John Wren, the Irish connection, the depression years and the resilience of cycling to survive. It describes how the handicap system when linked to professionalism and gambling became a poisonous cocktail for cycling.

Next it profiles the incredible achievements of Alf Grenda, Alf Goullet, the 'ironman' Reg McNamara, the amiable Bob Spears, our first world sprint champion, and follows the paths of the legends abroad. The roaring Twenties are highlighted by the exploits of Oppy in Europe and Cecil Walker who dominated racing in the States during the thirties.

The post war period belonged to Patto and Mockridge, but also describes a decline that almost spelled the end of the sport. When even the sprinting might of Gordon Johnson could not reverse the downturn in our cycling fortunes.

The story then turns to a new era of champions like Danny Clark, the Allan brothers, Laurie Venn, Hilton Clarke, Keith Oliver and others who blew new life into track cycling. The book

continues with Stephen Pate's record breaking 4th Austral and concludes with the 2001 Austral season that unearthed so much exciting talent for the future.

The publication is a non-profit production and proceeds will be donated to the 'Maillot Jaune' for the benefit of cycling. The Maillot Jaune led by Gordon Johnson is a social cycling club that raises funds at regular functions to help cycling and inducts four candidates every year in the Victorian hall of fame.

Maillot Jaune historians like myself collect materials to establish a data base of our cycling history.

To keep the book within reach of all cycling fans we have decided to launch it for \$16 plus postage.

We hope to distribute the book via cycling clubs, major cycling outlets and direct to the public. We have received enthusiastic response from the cycling fraternity, encouraging us to proceed with publication. However we do need sponsorship to offset the cost of printing, binding and distribution.

Printing cost per unit is \$7.80 including GST for 750 copies, but \$10 per unit for 500 copies.
