I believe it was a pretty clear sprint for 1st with Richard crossing the line ahead of J-P. I was wondering how Garron (who I know can sprint) and Lawrence were feeling as we approached the line on the final lap but I had just enough in the legs for 3rd. Thanks to my chase buddies, and well done to Rich and J-P, who spent around seven laps out on their own. They are tough fellas for sure.


B Grade

There were 13 riders in B this week – the same suspects as at Gruyere the week before, plus Dave Anderson (Northern), lan McGeoch and a couple more – and it was a cracking autumn afternoon. The headwind on the uphill was fairly brutal at first but dropped somewhat by an hour in.

My plan was to be unseen until the last 100 metres, but I found myself on the front a couple of times early on. As expected, John Blyth and Anthony Netkow pushed it up the hill most laps while the rest of us concentrated on the wheel in front. Paul Firth, lan and Dave also did plenty, Stuart Bendall too, and we reached halfway without fuss.

With four or five laps to go, the first inevitability came to pass when Anthony simply rode away and no one could follow. With three to go, John did a flyer up the hill (the second inevitability) and got about 100 metres up the road and past C Grade, who were on the bell in front of us. We overtook them up the hill, then backed off as they responded and went by again, led by John Williams I think. We now sat off the back of C all the way around to the finish and let them sprint; then it was time to get organised in pursuit. John was still in sight. I went to the front up the hill and suggested to Craig Oliver that we would catch him if we shared the work. Sure enough, with Paul, Ian and Craig Stannard among the helpers, we did (share) and we did (catch him).

There's a crosswind from the right. The road kicks up, Paul shifts right and lights the fuse, and I go with him. I have the perfect sit but am expecting Dave Anderson or lan to challenge from behind. A hundred to go, I edge out from behind Paul but wait a moment longer. Fifty to go, I go hard, and draw up beside him, he senses someone coming and finds a bit more, and I get within a handspan but no further. It's Paul 2nd, me 3rd. Anthony is watching us sprint from the side of the road. Strava gives Paul and me the same time for the sprint as Richard Abel in A Grade and Brendan Wain in C.
