B Grade

Rocco Drive, Scoresby. If you haven't raced there yet, it's kind of a cross between Dunlop Road (small light-industrial area, quiet on Sunday) and the Loop/Teardrop (~1km lap, fast downhill soon after the start/finish, testing uphill finish). But newer, wider roads than both, a squarer loop than the Loop so there's always a headwind somewhere, and a sharp kick up through a wide-ish left-hander — not like the tight bottom corner at the Teardrop — to start the sprint. On the plus side, a small brewery that is happy to open up for our post-race presentations.

A big (for us) B grade field of 25, including several A-graders who struggle to compete in A grade on this fast, hard course, but would be very hard to shake off and can handle an uphill sprint just fine, thank you very much. A majority Eastern bunch, but with a handful from Northern, Brunswick and Carnegie Caulfield. Not a rider among them who didn't look capable of making the podium.

It didn't take long to realise it was going to be tough. We were averaging ~37 km/h initially, at least according to Dean Niclasen (a regular in A recently on flatter courses) until he was dropped and pulled out. Perry Peters (always

A unless hills, bloody fast in a sprint) did some solid turns on the front. Paul Webster (ditto Perry) was sitting comfortably mid-pack, Ray Russo (remind me what were you doing in B, Ray?) was complaining we needed to go harder, and the usual B-grade workhorses were in the mix as well -- Paul Firth, Matt Clarke (both in my group at Garfield; both rode away from me there), Walter Savini, Grant Farr, Dale Walton (not that long up from C but improving steadily), Mark Edwards, Pete Morris, Craig Oliver, Marcus Herzog, Ross Clark and Dave Anderson from Northern, one or two of the strangers and me – pretty much everyone, really.

There were a couple of short-lived solo escape attempts – like me, all probably hoping to tempt a mate or two across the gap. Walter had a couple of laps off on his own. Then Matt Clarke and a stranger rode away. The mystery man was back in the bunch a few laps later, but Matt was now well up the road. Not everyone realised he was away (I didn't), and there was never much of an organised chase. Grant went to the front for a couple of laps, lifted the pace and apparently halved Matt's gap, but then was spent, and no one could or would take up the chase. I focused on staying close to a wheel on the wide downhill and through the fast, slightly tighter than 90



degrees corner at the bottom. From there it's a couple of hundred metres into a headwind to the steep kick up to the line, and you can save so much energy each lap by not having to chase back on across there. But found myself with a gap to close, as often as not, after having to wipe off speed as people in front braked to go into the corner. (By contrast, Grant stayed at the back and took it easy down the hill, let a gap open, then took the corner fast and let momentum carry him up to the bunch with less effort -- smart!)

We never sighted Matt again – he dug in and stayed away for a strong win. There were still plenty of contenders for the minor places when we got the bell. In a nice safe bunch sprint, Perry took 3rd, a whisker behind Corey Williams (CCCC) in 2nd. I started too far back, made up a few places in the sprint but finished 10th or 11th. Thereabouts. It's an excellent circuit, but definitely not a gimme for a climber when strong sprinters can stay in touch until the end (just ask Nathan White!) Thanks to everyone who made it happen and kept us safe.

C Grade

Race committee take note, we need to bottle these conditions and roll them out for every race. Twenty degree Celsius starting temp, and never rising above 24 degrees. Not a breath of wind and clear sunny skies. Chuck in an on-course brewery and I'm coming here for my holidays!

First off though, we need to perform over 35 laps of a circuit that looks harmless enough at first sight, but by the 29th time up the hill, hands up all those who weren't blowing a tad?

With a couple of laps to go, it was clearly set up for the sprinters that had been saving their legs, so just for the hell of it, I thought I might throw in a fast lap or two and see what happens. Dean Tune was soon on to my wheel, and at one point we thought we might be able to go on with it, but there was plenty of horsepower, not far behind us, like already in our draft.

Hoping for a lap or two to recover, I drifted back in the field, but when the bell rings on a short fast lap like Rocco, twelfth wheel is not a great position to be in.

Justin van Tol took a flier down the hill and no one seemed interested in chasing. With everyone still in a line following wheels heading into the bottom corner, I knew I was too far back to influence the result, so I elected to go way too early from the left to see if I could a) catch Justin and/or b) maybe hang on for a place.

Justin died pretty suddenly, so a) was achieved, and with 100m to go I was feeling fast, strong and in-front. Lactic struck first, rapidly followed by Haydn and Dean. I managed to limp across the line for third marginally ahead of fast finishing Andre, and goodness knows how many others in close contention.



The Beach Hut Brewery was a fabulous spot to recover, and I'd still be there now if I didn't have a 25k ride home.

Order Your ECC Club Kit

You can now order your new Eastern CC kit at https://www.bikegearnow.com/eastern-cycling-club The Password for the website is: eastern2021.

The design has changed minimally (cuff colours), but we believe the quality is even better, and the price is around 20% less (\$229 for Jersey/Knicks). The range includes long and short sleeve jerseys, bib and non-bib Knicks, wind vests, arm warmers, single piece speed suits, and caps.

Sizing - John Williams has samples of the kit in men's sizing from XS to XXXL (in Blackburn CC colours). He will bring them to races for members to inspect and try for size. We would prefer women to discuss their specific sizing needs with Doug Reynolds on 0418 382 330 so we can get the size just right.

We have the first kit on order as a trial to ensure the production matches expectations. We are hoping to have that in our hands by end of April. In the meantime the website is open for orders, but the production order will not be placed on the factory until we are happy with that first sample. From there we expect a 6 week lead time, meaning first delivery in July.

VeloEx, run by ECC member Doug Reynolds, have provided the club with great versatility with small orders (most suppliers insist minimum order of 50), a great website and competitive pricing. In addition, if you wreck your kit in a fall, VeloEx will replace it at 40% discount.


